Grieving:

Recently, the local hobby has been rocked by the passing of two of our dear friends and long time collectors; Denny Thayer and Roger Roy.

Denny passed away on September 5, at the age of 70. For many years, Denny was a teacher and coach for the West Carrollton Schools and the Warren County Career Center. Denny was a member of the BCCA and the Miami Valley Chapter. He was an eclectic collector who shared a passion for both Dayton and Cincinnati breweriana. He also liked the ladies and collected "pretty lady" breweriana pieces from all over. He and his wife, Sandy, have been a big part of the MV Chapter and their annual Canvention show. Both worked non-stop to insure its success. Although putting in long and strenuous hours, both of them always had a welcoming smile that made you happy just to be there. They also hosted many chapter meetings at their beautiful home where all of us were awe struck by their collection and how it was displayed. His passing leaves a loss to everyone and our thoughts and prayers go out to Sandy, Patrick, Jess, and the rest of the Thayer family.

Only 19 days later we were again rattled by the loss of longtime Cincinnati collector Roger Roy. He passed away September 24, 2016, at the age of 61. Roger and his wife of 33 years, Barb, were fixtures at local breweriana shows for many years. He was a member of both BCCA and NABA and was active in both the Queen City and the Miami Valley Chapters. Barb and Roger had just hosted the July Miami Valley Chapter meeting at their home. Those of us who attended know that Roger was struggling then. But it was obvious it was just something he had to do, and that he enjoyed doing it. Roger collected all things pre-prohibition and had a special fondness for both pretty lady lithographs and brewery glasses. His collecting interests also included whiskey shot glasses and he had amassed a large collection spanning the US.

For many years Roger was a professional drummer and traveled on the road with his bands. He also was a long time coach of youth baseball. In 2005 he was given a heroism award by the local sheriff's office for attempting to rescue a man from a burning car. Roger suffered burns during his effort.

At the time of his death he was the Procurement Manager for ECU Corporation. His passing came after a heroic three year battle with a debilitating disease; Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis. Besides his wife, he leaves his adoring boys Ryan and Aaron, and his daughter-in-law Mindy. His loss leaves a giant void in the collecting community. We will miss his infectious smile, sense of humor, and the enthusiasm he brought to our hobby.

We are so much better for having known both of them.

Publicity:

Shortly after the 2014 Luck o'-the-Irish show I spoke with Chapter President BeerDave Gausepohl about show publicity. Dave was so busy with other obligations and I thought I could take some of the workload off of him. Dave was more than happy to have the help and I set out upon the task of "getting the word out."

I contacted the major breweriana clubs and was able to get events listed in both their magazines and websites. We also attempted to get more show flyers into the hands of potential collectors and these were distributed to craft breweries and other related venues.

After accepting the position of vice president, myself, President Doug Groth and Treasurer Ken Stidham began the task of e-mail "blasts," not only to chapter members, but to hundreds of other collectors. This was a daunting challenge that necessitated going through membership directories and setting up the lists. There were no short cuts. Unfortunately, many of our messages bounced back as e-mail addresses had been changed and not updated by the members.

Currently, you will see quarter-page paid ads in the magazines of the two national organizations we are affiliated with. We are also lucky to have the tremendous support of our Dayton friends just up the road.

We are working hard to expose our hobby to potential members. The unbelievable growth of micro, and now, craft breweries has created a whole new group of breweriana collectors, and potential collectors. The promotional products produced by this growing industry are indeed legitimate collectibles themselves. Last year at the annual Luck-o'-the Irish show we invited some of these breweries to attend our show. Mad Tree Brewery was there and setup. A lot of interest was shown in their advertising products and they were nice enough to even donate items for the raffle.

We are also working with the Over-the-Rhine Brewery District to inform them of who we are and what we do. We believe there are potential new members within their organization. (See separate story elsewhere in this update.)

But I believe the best source of publicity is you. Yes, you can get the word out. Do you know somebody who collects but is not active in a club? What about that craft brewery enthusiast? Please get the word out to them. Hang a show poster in your favorite brewery or tavern. E-mail, texting, and social media are all great ways to do it. You can even still pick up a telephone and call someone. If everyone invited

just one person, we would increase our participation exponentially. Imagine if we each contacted even more people.

It is your chapter, your show, and your hobby. For our continued growth, please consider promoting our show and getting more people involved. Thank you.

Over-the-Rhine Brewery District:

As we all know, the Cincinnati area has a rich and colorful brewing history. Most of us in the hobby are collectors of breweriana of some type. I think we would all agree that at some time or another we have all delved into the history of our pieces and the breweries they come from.

We are so fortunate in Cincinnati to have so many former brewery buildings still remaining. Yes, we have lost some over the last few years, but considering their age, we are still very lucky. Many of these pre-prohibition locations are even still involved in brewery operations, like the former Moerlein Brewery (Rhinegeist) and the former Kaufman Brewery (Christian Moerlein). The former Schoenling Brewery (1934) serves as one of three homes for the Samuel Adams Boston Brewery.

At one time Cincinnati was a major center of beer production in the United State and seventeen 17 breweries operated in just the Over-the-Rhine (OTR). I'm not sure, but I believe we have a higher percentage of old breweries remaining standing than in any other major brewing center. Most of these are concentrated in the OTR area of Cincinnati, an area so named by early German immigrants as it was situated north of the Miami Erie Canal, nicknamed the "Rhine" after the famous river in the Fatherland.

With a vision of preserving this rich history, a handful of forward thinking visionaries formed the OTR Brewery District in 2003. This volunteer driven organization has taken on innumerable tasks and challenges with a goal of not only preserving the remaining brewery properties, but likewise, improving the entire OTR area. Major projects have included repurposing of properties, improving safety, obtaining historic signage, and their annual Beer Barons Ball and Hall of Fame.

But no venture has been so large, and so advantageous, as their goal of establishing a Brewing Heritage Trail through the OTR. This trail, similar to the Freedom Trail in Boston, will offer interactive stations where those walking the trail will be able to learn about the OTR breweries and the people connected with them. Unlike other trails, many of these sites will actually have remnants of the buildings. The OTR Brewery District describes it as "The Brewing Heritage Trail will be an urban trail that celebrates the City of Cincinnati brewing heritage and creates a positive, marketable image for the city." The diverse stakeholders and friends of the Brewery District have worked hard to make this capstone project a reality and it is scheduled to begin operations next year.

There is so much we collectors, and historians, have in common with the fine folks of the OTR Brewery District. They strongly encourage anyone and everyone to share their brewing history with them. This includes stories and memorabilia. No, they don't want to take our breweriana, just the pictures of it.

This past August they held a "Digital brew" event where images of breweriana were scanned for inclusion in the Public Library's digital images library.

With so much in common, it became apparent that an alliance of some type is needed between our two organizations. We are one of the oldest chapters in the hobby and affiliated with the two premier national clubs; The Breweriana Collectors Club of America (BCCA) and the National Association of Breweriana Advertising (NABA). We are fortunate to have many long time collectors who have impressive collections as well as a wealth of brewing history knowledge. We can share this, while at the same time encouraging others to join our hobby. As they say; "The more the merrier."

We have been working behind the scenes to nourish this relationship. As a chapter, we have joined their organization. October 19 we had a joint meeting with their Board of Directors. On November 9, we will attend the OTR BD regular meeting being held at the Moerlein Malthouse. We will do a brief presentation on the hobby and display some of our breweriana for everyone to see. At the same time, we will encourage everyone to attend our Sunday After Thanksgiving Show (Nov. 27) to see what we are all about. This annual show is held in the same Moerlein Malthouse, located in the OTR.

There you will find so much more about their history, work, and vision. Collectors are also encouraged to support of their effort by joining their organization and attending their monthly meetings. These meetings are held at various sites in the area and are free and open to members and non-member alike. All of this information is available on their site.

We hope this relationship will be the beginning of a friendship, and an alliance, that will be of benefit to all of us, now and into the future.
